

IRS Tax Transcript: How to Request

During the verification process, another option is to obtain an *IRS Tax Return Transcript* from the IRS. Always be sure to request your *Tax Return Transcript* – a document from the IRS that is a summary of your tax return as filed.

Transcripts are available to request online and provided two ways:

- **Online** Tax Return Transcript available to print or download.
 - Please be aware: this option contains multiple security steps. You must register with the IRS to use this service. The registration process takes approximately 15+ minutes. You will be asked to provide sensitive personal information (credit card or bank account number) as well as to verify through a mobile phone text and email confirmation.
- **By Mail** Tax Return Transcript sent to the mailing address from your latest tax return typically in **5**-10 days.
 - You are not required to register with the IRS system, though you will enter SSN, date of birth, and address to match your tax return.

Instructions to Request:

- 1. Visit the IRS Get Transcript website at (<u>https://www.irs.gov/individuals/get-transcript</u>).
- 2. Select "Get Transcript Online" or "Get Transcript by Mail"
- 3. If requesting online, select "Get Transcript Online" and then "Get Started" to register to use the online service.
 - a. Follow the on-screen instructions to verify personal information, email, financial accounts/credit card number and mobile phone number.
 - b. Proceed to request "Tax Return Transcript" for proper tax year*
 - c. Download and save or print to send to the Financial Aid Office.
- 4. If requesting by mail, select "Get Transcript by Mail"
 - a. Follow the on-screen instructions to enter name, date of birth, and Social Security number.
 - b. Enter your address which was used for your tax return. Please note the IRS uses the United States Postal Service (USPS) version of your address.
 - You may need to exclude punctuation (no period after abbreviations, no #) in your address
 - You may need to abbreviate (Apt. rather than Apartment or St. rather than street)
 - c. For joint returns, use the primary tax filer's SSN, date of birth, address and zip code.
 - d. When your address is verified, select the tax year* and Tax Return Transcript to request.

You can get various <u>transcript types</u> online or by mail. The method you used to file your tax return, and whether you had a balance due, affects your <u>current year transcript availability</u>. **Note:** If you need a photocopy of your return, you must use <u>Form 4506</u>.



What You Need

To register and use this service, you need:

- your <u>SSN</u>, date of birth, filing status and mailing address from latest tax return,
- access to your email account,
- your personal account number from a credit card, mortgage, home equity loan, home equity line of credit or car loan, and
- a mobile phone with your name on the account.

What You Get

- View, print or download your transcript
- Transcript types available online
- Username and password to return later

Requesting by phone or in-person:

Get Transcript by MAIL

What You Need

To use this service, you need your:

- <u>SSN</u> or <u>Individual Tax Identification Number</u> (ITIN),
- date of birth, and
- mailing address from your latest tax return

What You Get

- Transcripts arrive in **5 to 10 calendar days** at the address we have on file for you
- <u>Transcript types</u> available by mail

If you experience issues with the online Tax Return Transcript request, you may try the automated phone transcript service at 1-800-908-9946 to receive the transcript via mail Please allow 5-10 days for delivery.

If you experience further issues, you may choose to request an appointment with the IRS In-person by looking up your location on the IRS website (<u>https://www.irs.gov/uac/contact-your-local-irs-office-1).</u>

*The tax year used for a FAFSA is usually the calendar year prior to the start of the academic year

- 2015 is the tax year for the 2016-17 academic year (fall 2016, spring 2017, summer 2017)
- 2014 is the tax year for the 2015-16 academic year (fall 105, spring 2016, summer 2016
